PASTOR'S REPORT



Dear Living Hope Church. This season of getting settled in the work with you of serving here in the valley, and of settling with my family here has been so very good and special. We had a spectacular summer – I think we were in the water every day, whether river, straight or lake. And we would show up there, and low and behold, there was some LHC'ers there, too! And we would play and splash and enjoy life together. That has been our experience here. It has been so easy to get to know you all and to share life together with you that it feels for us like a year ago before I knew you is so far distant! This has been a wonderful season for us, thank you for welcoming up and accepting us and loving us so very well.

Hello, Living Hope Church! I would like to share with you a year in review of Children's Ministry. It's hard to believe that a year has come and gone already. I have been serving as the Childrens Ministry Coordinator since Lori Root stepped down this time last year. This year has brought forth much growth in the program. We continue to see the number of children attending the program increase. On an average Sunday we have 30 or more children. In our older class (Rocks/ Boulders Grade 1-6) we have seen the most growth with 20-25 children being a typical Sunday. How amazing is that!

This year brought many changes to our program. We have changed how we sign our kids up, firming up our plan to protect protocol, Full Body Sunday and we have also began writing our own curriculum. We now follow the same theme's and verses as the congregation does each week, but at the children's level. We are excited to have this level of control over the content we are delivering to the children. This has left much space for creativity, imagination and wonder. Our goal is to have children authentically seek Christ and deepen their relationship and understanding of him.

We are excited about Children's Bible Literacy. As leaders we are helping the children set their own goals and meet their markers. This is how they are learning the bible and scripture verses. Ultimately, we want children making faith on their own. The addition of Full body Sunday has been a huge success. The children are offered the choice to help serve in different areas of the church. On The first

Sunday of each month you will then see children greeting, helping serve coffee, hosting the service and many other jobs. The enthusiasm from the children is amazing. They already embody servant hearts to help run the church.

We continue to have the best volunteers in this program; it has been a joy for me to get to know some of them in a deeper way. The children are deeply blessed by their servant hearts and willingness to show up and love on them each week. Last year we had our first appreciation BBQ at the end of the school year. We gathered volunteers, built community and shared in a delicious meal. I hope to continue this as a yearly event. We are always on the hunt for more volunteers in the Children's Ministry program. As the numbers of children increase, so does the need for more adults. There's a free awesome BBQ if you sign up! Thank you all for your support encouragement and kind words over this past year, but more importantly thank you for investing in our children and the future of our church and world.

We will finish the spring looking at what the Bible says about the church and faith. We will also look at some of the question’s kids have been asking about God and our world and we will see what the Bible has to say about them. This spring we are also planning on having guitar lessons for youth. Hopefully we will be able to encourage some of them towards helping with music at youth group and maybe even at church.

I want to thank all the adults and junior leaders who have given their time to help at junior youth. It has been a big commitment and the youth have been hugely blessed by their participation and leadership. Finally, I want to say that leading Junior Youth to be a huge blessing in my life and the life of my family. It has become a highlight of my week. I love hanging out with the youth and leaders. I’m excited to continue being a part of this ministry in Christ.

Here is a brief summary of what the last year has looked like for the worship ministry at Living Hope:

- I've witnessed a massive change in how the congregation is engaging in worship. Over the last few years the congregation has been noticeably more engaged as they respond to God in worship. This of course isn't the only measure of a life of worship but we're happy to see this progress.
- We rely heavily on our volunteers in the worship ministry and the demands can lead to turnover. We appreciate the partnership we have with Queneesh School; however the extra effort required to worship in a gym is substantial and it does tend to wear out volunteers. Rehearsals require setup in a home or at the church office. On Sunday morning, the teams arrive at 8am to set up and do a sound check. The team often misses out on the fellowship side of the post service conversations due to the equipment that must be packed up. It's common for a leader or team member to put in between 7-9 hours per week to support this ministry. Please pray for or volunteer to help in these areas and consider helping where you can.
- From a volunteer perspective, the year started and ended very differently in our worship ministry. At the start of 2019 we had 4 worship leaders and a shortage of drummers and media help. We ended the year with the reverse. We're very thankful for those that have stepped in to support the media, but still need more musicians, leaders and sound techs. As a general note we're always appreciative of anyone that will help setting up and packing up.
- I'd like to highlight the dedication of Mike Coady this year on sound. Mike has been faithfully and humbly serving as he carried the load through the year with few breaks. Please thank and encourage Mike when you see him.
- Lisa Deith and I have been meeting regularly with Micah to strategize, work out bugs, and pray together. Please pray that we would be empowered by the Holy Spirit to lead with boldness and humility as all of us at Living Hope have our affections stirred up for Christ and His glory above all things.

Please connect with me if you're interested in serving on sound, media, and worship teams in this coming season. We are so incredibly thankful to God for those who already give of their time and energy to serve.

MISSION'S TEAM



The Missions Team at Living Hope met periodically for prayer and discussion. In order to coordinate the outreach ministries of the church, both globally and locally. On the global front, this was the third year that a team from the Comox Valley traveled to Uganda to assist in the Widows' Garden Project (WGP). Sylvie Chmiliar from Living Hope was part of the team that joined David Moore, Volunteer Project Officer, in order to provide widows with start-up funds for leasing land to farm. This year, the project was able to support 129 widows, bringing the total to 490 widows whom WGP has helped to provide food-security assistance.

After preparing and waiting for several years, Living Hope, as part of the Safe haven Refugee Sponsorship group, welcomed a family of seven to the Comox Valley. The Syrian family arrived in mid-February and were well looked after by a large team of volunteers, including Sharon Snider and Krista Barlow from Living Hope. As a congregation, Living Hope was quick to donate for meeting practical needs of the family, providing them with a durable vacuum and items such as soccer clothing, children's clothing and homeware. When the family decided to move to be close to their relatives in Victoria in July, Living Hope was there to help pack up the house and bless them on their way.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNING

Living Hope's ELL ministry started three years ago as a practical way to care for our Chinese congregants and their friends in the community. We offer weekly English lessons for beginners and more advanced learners, facilitated by Esther Karasova. In addition, we provide conversation partnerships in order to practice English while building friendships. This year we also launched an ELL Bible study which is meeting a need for deeper spiritual nurturing among the Chinese friends. Roughly 14 volunteers from Living Hope help to facilitate these lessons, Bible studies and conversation partnerships. Several times a year we gather for a celebration of some sort, complete with an amazing array of Chinese food. Getting involved with the ELL group is a great way to connect with Living Hope and the world beyond the Comox Valley. We welcome new participants!

In September Christine, the Principal, requested some monies to support a sailing program for some of the Grade 7 students. We were able to assist in this and the families very much appreciated our efforts to get the price as low as possible.

We bought several pairs of runners for the students in both Sept and Dec which was much appreciated. Also, in Sept, Phyllis' friend Kay, again knit about 30 winter hats for boys and girls. The Treasure sale is a time student can "buy" Christmas gifts for their families. We assisted by wrapping these lovely gifts. Annually in June, our year-end, Living Hope provides a staff luncheon -for 50 staff this year. New this year was a volunteer picnic lunch in June which completed our year. We have 11 volunteers who are involved in the Breakfast program, reading, mentoring and baking cookies.

WIDOWS' GARDENS PROJECT

This was my fourth visit to the Widows' Gardens Project and the third time a team has accompanied me. **Ann Pokol** (Bay Community), **Diane Jacquest** (St. Peter's Anglican), and **Sylvie Chmiliar** (Living Hope) spent 19 October nights in-country. Seven days were spent in the Project area interviewing widows next in line for inclusion in the Project and visiting homes and gardens.

The team brought with them various items for distribution to widows and for Kigarama Primary School, where 12 widows' kids are currently being sponsored by Living Hope individuals and other Valley supporters. They also brought 50 re-usable sanitary kits for girls who were distributed to students of a local secondary school. (These had been assembled and provided by the Comox Valley "Days for Girls" group).

This was the first year the Project had reached out to widows' groups outside of its original geographic scope. With the help of Elly Nankunda (Local Project Coordinator) assisted by Rose Kitareeba (Ruborogota group) and Perez Bemereire (Rubingo group) **129 widows** were added to the previous 361 to **total 490**. Next year we hope to add another 138, funding permitting.

In addition to funding to provide leased land (3/4 acre each) and seeds to the 129 widows, the team brought with them discretionary funds to assist a few especially needy individuals and to provide solar lighting and a rainwater catchment system to Kigarama PS – notably raised by Bay Community Church through the efforts of Pearl Morin (2018 Team) and Puntledge Elementary School kindness of Sylvia Dakin (2018 team). Several Living Hope families are actively sponsoring students via the Uganda Possibilities Project (UPP) set up by Bay Community with Pearl as Voluntary Program Administrator. (The opportunity to sponsor other widow's kids is open to anyone. Please contact me at the email address below if you are interested in learning more).

This past summer, 4 interns from the University of Utrecht carried out a 6-week evaluation of the Project, concluding that this form of assistance was sustainable and replicable. They also suggested adding an element of microfinance (small business loans at very low rates of interest) so that many could diversify their sources of income.

The widows reported to the interns that their status in the community had improved hugely. They were now respected as self-supporting; no longer beggars.

Thank you to **Tim Folkman** for his help in facilitating and overseeing the Project and to you, **Living Hope**, for the privilege of serving the widows of southwestern Uganda and the Living God who loves them in this truly impactful way.
